

## **Updates for 'Explore Scotland by Rail and Sea'**

**The Tall Ship 'Glenlee'** (see page 98 of guidebook). The 'Glenlee tall ship has moved berth in Glasgow. It is now located at the new Riverside Museum, and can easily be seen from the railway line to Partick railway station. To reach the ship take any train from Glasgow Queen Street or Central stations to either Helensburgh Central, Milngavie or Balloch. The ship may be seen from the train, and is about a 9 minute walk from the station. The route is signposted.

The **Riverside Museum** has now opened (page 99 of guidebook). This new museum is a replacement for the former Glasgow Transport Museum at Kelvinhall. The impressive building is set in front of the Glenlee tall ship and can easily be seen from the railway line. Take a train to Partick station from where the museum is a nine minute walk away. The route is sign posted for the Museum and Glenlee ship.

**Caledonian MacBrayne Ferry to Dunoon** (page 120). This service is now operated by Argyll Ferries and has become a passenger only service not carrying motor vehicles. Services are still rail connected, and joint ferry and rail tickets may be purchased from staffed railway stations.

**Stranraer station and Stena Line ferry link** (page 138). The ferry terminal has now closed, so Stranraer station is no longer the interchange for ferries. A bus link has been provided (details from Scotrail or TravelineScotland), however it leaves from Ayr station, and no Stranraer.

**Getting around Orkney (page 49)**. The **Octo Bus** is a local Orkney company providing year round service to the west mainland, and a seasonal service for tourists. Places of interest served include: Stromness (for the Pier Arts Centre, the Stromness Museum and stunning views across to the hilly island of Hoy), Maeshowe World Heritage Site, Standing Stones of Stenness, Ring of Brodgar, Orkney Brewery, Skara Brae, Marwick Head RSPB reserve. Brough of Birsay, Kirbuster Farm Museum, Broch of Gurness, Corrigal Farm Museum, Binscarth Woods (Orkney's largest woodland) and Kirkwall (for the Orkney Museum, St Magnus Cathedral and Highland Park Distillery).
